

G: Discussion

The results suggested that:

- Although Sphagnum GPP is less sensitive than other plots to vegtation % cover, this plots were the most efficient to store C in winter.

- Also, the BARE PEAT, and SPHAGNUM treatments tended to increased CH4 emissions compared to CONTROL. This is due to the fact that as peat was removed, the water table was higher, promoting CH4 production and limiting its consumption. As a conclusion, **BARE PEAT**, and **SPHAGNUM** treatments promotes plant diversity, but their positive effect on C fluxes are still not observable after 2 (CH_{A}) and 3 (CO_{2}) years of monitoring. However, the addition of Sphagnum is advised as it may restore C storing functioning faster than when colonisation is let free to proceed such as in the **BARE PEAT** plots.





- When no Sphagnum were added, the colonising vegetation may be more sensitive to temperature than control vegetation. Increased CO₂ emissions in early colonisation stages can be a negative point of the vegetation restoration.
