Figure S3. Experimental and simulated NO₃, N₂O₅ and NO₂ concentration profiles versus reaction time. Measured NO₃ (\blacktriangle), N₂O₅ (\bullet) and NO₂ (\blacklozenge) are shown along with their simulated temporal profiles (—NO₃, —N₂O₅, —NO₂). Also shown is NO₂ concentration calculated from the Keq and the observed of N₂O₅ and NO₃ concentrations (\bullet). Top panel: 0 ppmv C₂H₆. Middle panel: 1106 ppmv C₂H₆ and secondary reactions not included, yields a value of k₂ = 7.60 × 10⁻¹⁹ molecule⁻¹ cm³ s⁻¹. Bottom panel: 1106 ppmv C₂H₆ with secondary reactions included (see Table 1), yields a value of k₂ = 4.23 × 10⁻¹⁹ molecule⁻¹ cm³ s⁻¹.

Measured NO₃ (\blacktriangle), N₂O₅ (\bullet) and NO₂ (\blacklozenge) are shown along with their simulated temporal profiles (—NO₃, —N₂O₅, —NO₂). Also shown is NO₂ concentration calculated from the Keq and the observed of N₂O₅ and NO₃ concentrations (\bullet). Top panel: 0 ppmv n-C₄H₁₀. Middle panel: 19.72 ppmv n-C₄H₁₀ and secondary reactions not included, yields a value of k₄ = 3.10 × 10⁻¹⁷ molecule⁻¹ cm³ s⁻¹. Bottom panel: 19.72 ppmv n-C₄H₁₀ with secondary reactions included (see Table 1), yields a value of k₄ = 1.35 × 10⁻¹⁷ molecule⁻¹ cm³ s⁻¹.



Figure S6. Experimental and simulated NO₃, N₂O₅ and NO₂ concentration profiles versus reaction time. Measured NO₃ (\blacktriangle), N₂O₅ (\bullet) and NO₂ (\blacklozenge) are shown along with their simulated temporal profiles (-NO₃, -N₂O₅, -NO₂). Also shown is NO₂ concentration calculated from the Keq and the observed of N₂O₅ and NO₃ concentrations (**O**). Top panel: 0 ppmv iso-C₄H₁₀. Middle panel: 19.72 ppmv iso-C₄H₁₀ and secondary reactions not included, yields a value of k₅ = 1.40 × 10⁻¹⁶ molecule⁻¹ cm³ s⁻¹. Bottom panel: 19.72 ppmv iso-C₄H₁₀ with secondary reactions included (see Table 1), yields a value of k₅ = 8.21 × 10⁻¹⁷ molecule⁻¹ cm³ s⁻¹.

Measured NO₃ (\blacktriangle), N₂O₅ (\bullet) and NO₂ (\blacklozenge) are shown along with their simulated temporal profiles ($-NO_3$, $-N_2O_5$, $-NO_2$). Also shown is NO₂ concentration calculated from the Keq and the observed of N₂O₅ and NO₃ concentrations (\bullet). Top panel: 0 ppmv 2,3-dimethy butane. Middle panel: 0.38 ppmv 2,3-dimethy butane and secondary reactions not included, yields a value of k₆ = 1.25 × 10⁻¹⁵ molecule⁻¹ cm³ s⁻¹. Bottom panel: 0.38 ppmv 2,3-dimethy butane with secondary reactions included (see Table 1), yields a value of k₆ = 6.32 × 10⁻¹⁶ molecule⁻¹ cm³ s⁻¹.

Middle panel: 0.63 ppmv cyclopentane and secondary reactions not included, yields a value of k₇ = 2.60 × 10⁻¹⁶ molecule⁻¹ cm³ s⁻¹. Bottom panel: 0.63 ppmv cyclopentane with secondary reactions included (see Table 1), yields a value of k₇ = 1.29 × 10⁻¹⁶ molecule⁻¹ cm³ s⁻¹.

Middle panel: 1.54 ppmv cyclohexane and secondary reactions not included, yields a value of k₈ = 2.50 × 10⁻¹⁶ molecule⁻¹ cm³ s⁻¹. Bottom panel: 1.54 ppmv cyclohexane with secondary reactions included (see Table 1), yields a value of k₈ = 1.27 × 10⁻¹⁶ molecule⁻¹ cm³ s⁻¹.
