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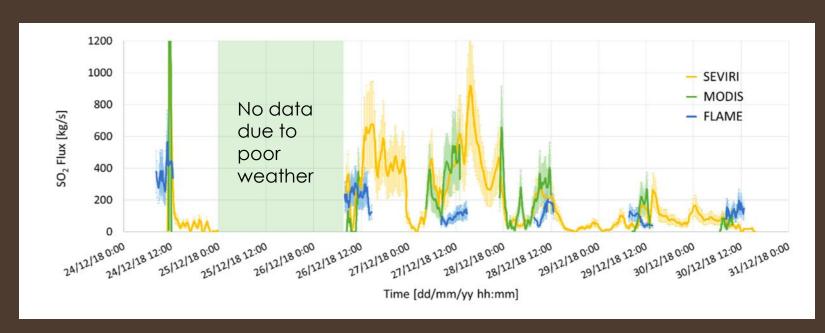
Etna's 2018 Christmas eruption

○ Large event at ~1115 the 24th, moderate activity for the next week



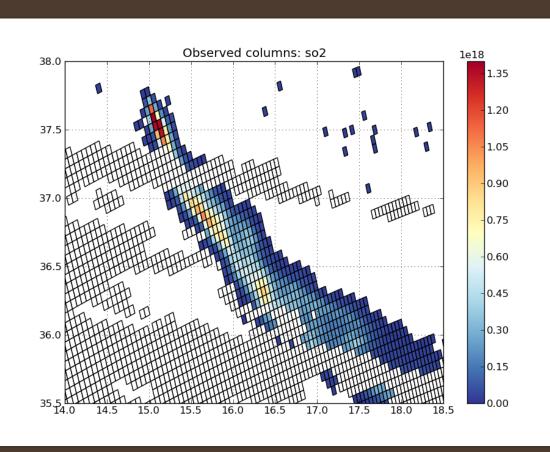

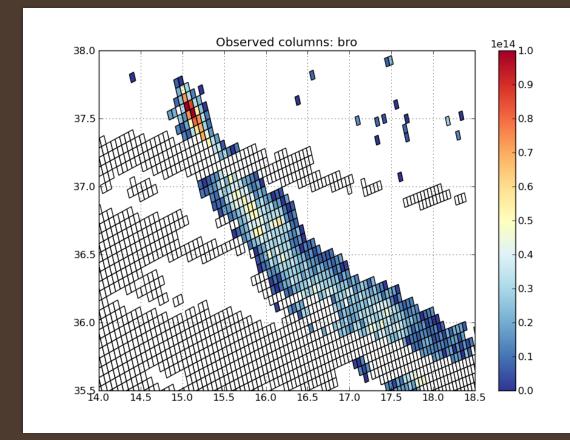
Volcanic Plume Top Height

TROPOMI detection of plume

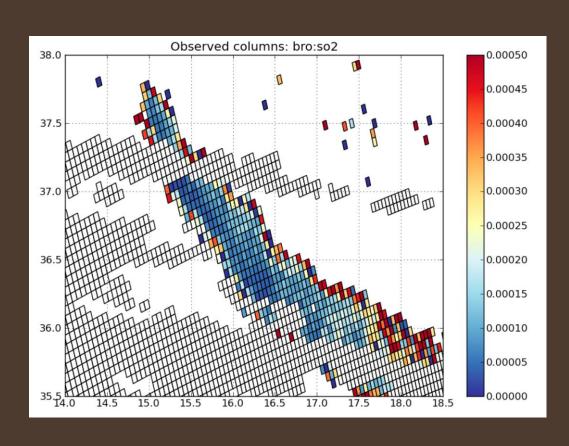
- TROPOMI overpass at ~12h each day.
 - O Best observation on the 25th!
- \circ Detect SO_2 , BrO and their ratio.
 - BrO/SO₂ ratios common measurement of Br-chemistry in plumes

TROPOMI detection of plume: SO₂, BrO



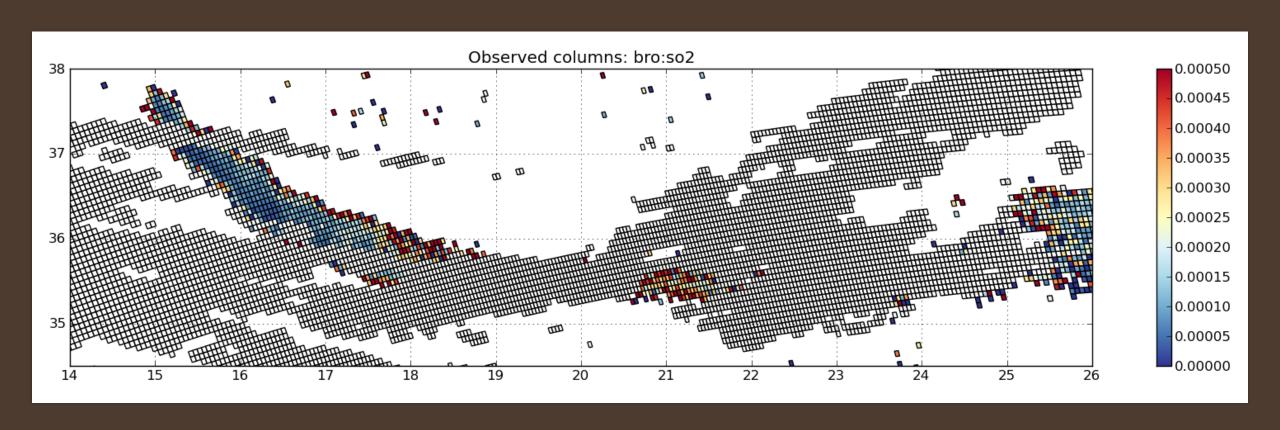


TROPOMI detection of plume: BrO/SO₂



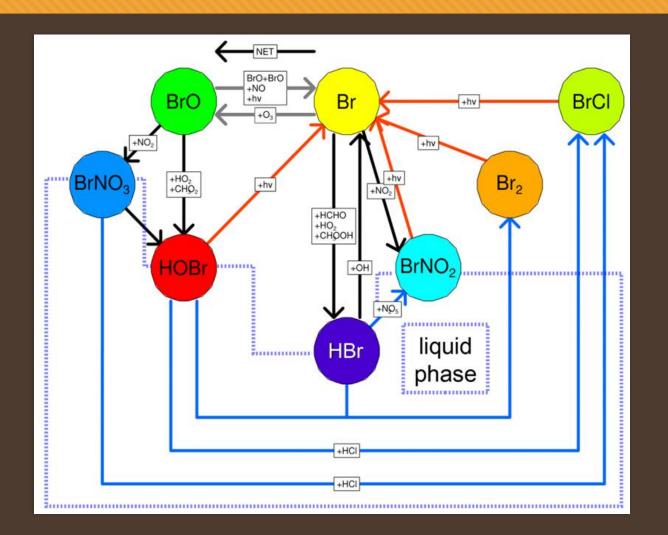
- O BrO production
- Across-plume variation.
 - \circ High at edges (~4 x 10⁻⁴)
 - "Core" of plume lower values (~1 x 10-4)

Bromine chemistry

- Bromine chemistry converts HBr to other forms and continually cycles bromine
- Several requirements:
 - Sunlight for photolysis
 - Acidic aerosol for liquid phase steps
 - Oxidants (esp. O_3) for gas-phase reactions
 - Consumes these oxidants
- O Heterogenous reaction: HOBr uptake (rate limiting), followed by reaction with Br- or Cl- (from aqueous phase HBr or HCl)
 - O Br₂ vs. BrCl product ratio dependant on ratio of HBr and HCl. Br₂ production 'preferred' unless bromide mostly depleted.



Can we model this?

- WRF-Chem Volcano (WCV) is our custom version of <u>WRF-Chem</u> [v4.1.5] that includes:
 - O Bromine, chlorine and mercury chemistry in reaction mechanism
 - O Volcanic emissions (pre-processed with modified version of PREPCHEM-SRC)
 - On-line calculation of aerosol surface areas and heterogenous reaction rates.
 - O Includes calculation of wet area, incorporating aerosol water.
 - Includes gas-phase diffusion limitation of heterogenous reactions
- O Run in multiple-nested mode, up to 1 km * 1 km resolution

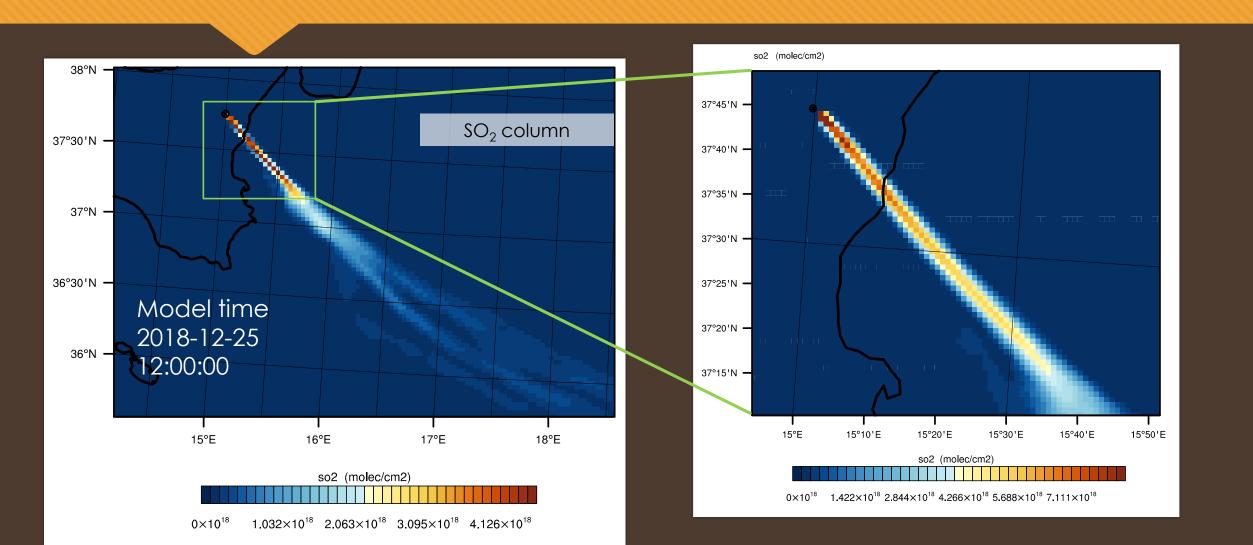
Model setup

- 320 kg SO₂/s flux rate
 - based on inversions from preliminary runs
 - O Within range for fluxes estimated for 26th and 27th in Corradini et al.,
- 4 km injection height, into single model layer (317m thick)
- Other species emitted at fixed ratio to SO₂.

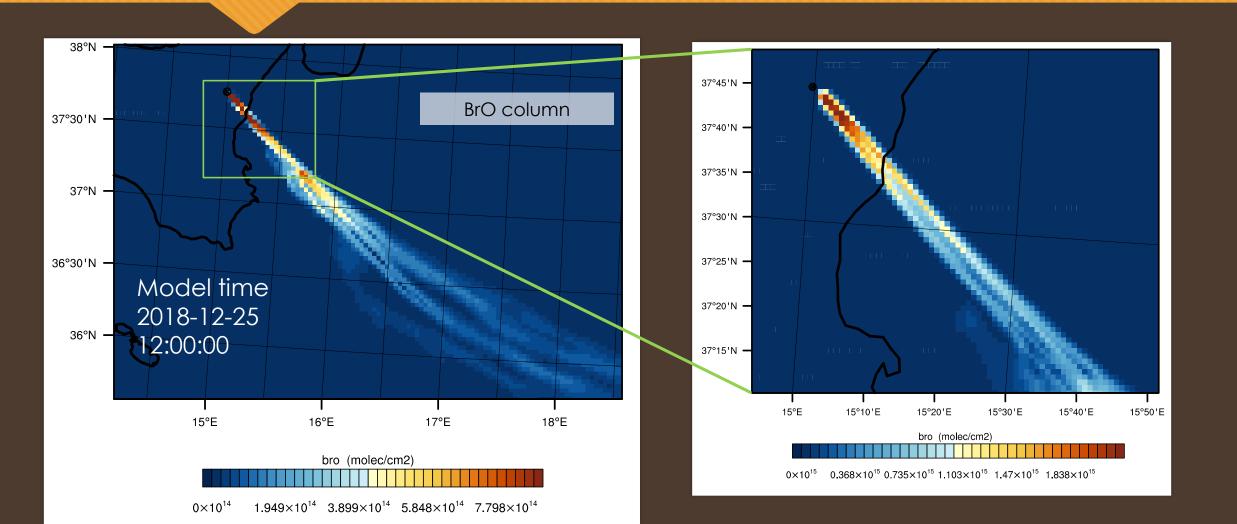

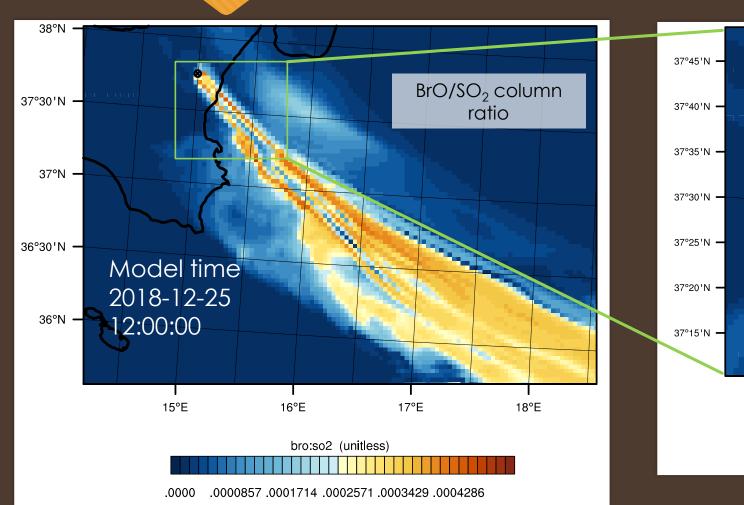
Modelled columns: SO₂

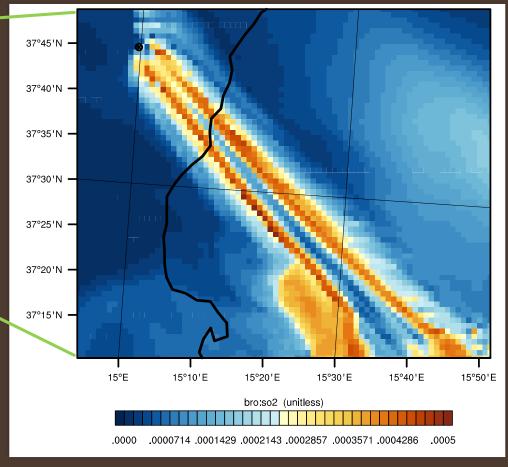


Modelled columns: BrO



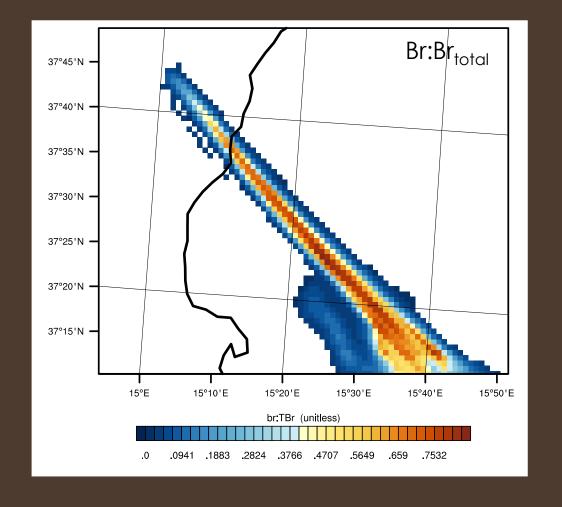
Modelled columns: BrO:SO₂ ratio





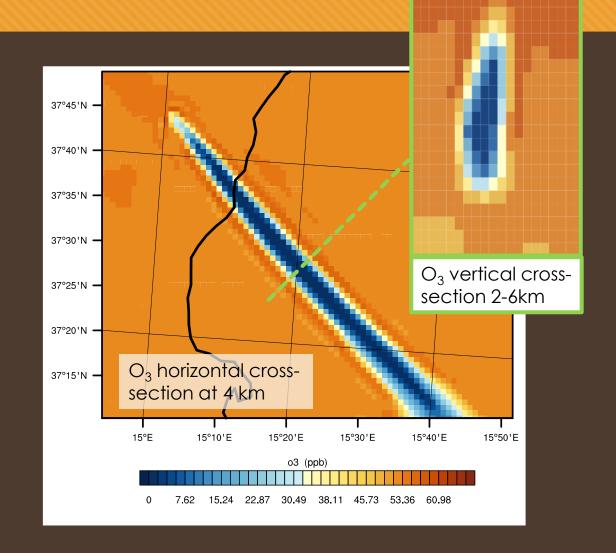
Br speciation variability

- In the core of the plume BrO:SO₂ ratios are much less than at the edges.
- O In this core Br atom is modelled to be a significant species, >50% of the bromine.



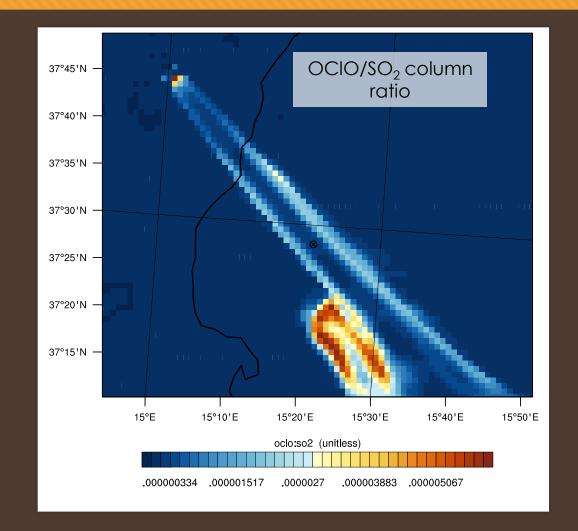
Cause of "coring" effect: O₃ depletion

- Bromine chemistry depletes O₃
- O In the core of the plume, O_3 is destroyed faster than it mixes in from background.
 - More total bromine in denser plume
 - O₃ destroyed in surrounding region before reaching core
- \circ O₃ depletion shifts BrO:Br steady-state towards Br.



Coring in OCIO

- WCV also shows production of OCIO
 - OCIO/SO2 column ratio 1-3 x 10⁻⁶
- BrCl is produced via chloride reaction in aerosol
- Photolysis of this produces reactive CI
- OCIO Even more of an "edge species" than BrO
 - Need both Br-cycling, and bromide absence so chloride reaction occurs

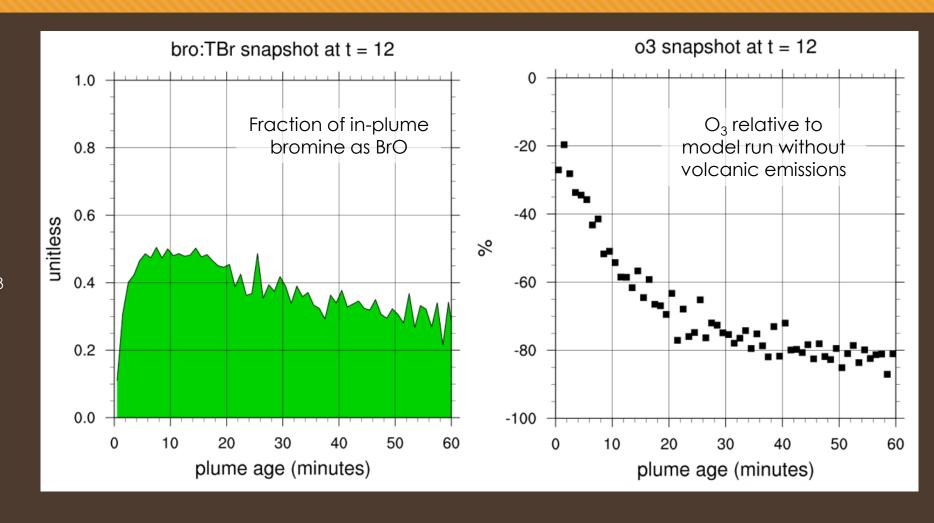


Bulk BrO:total bromine ratio

- What % of total bromine is observed in a ground based or satellite observation?
- Use BrO/total bromine ratio.
 - O Directly proportional to BrO/SO₂ ratio
- Here looking at bulk numbers, averaged over all parts of plume at a particular age.
 - Most observational techniques likely to be effectively bulk observations due to lack of spatial resolution

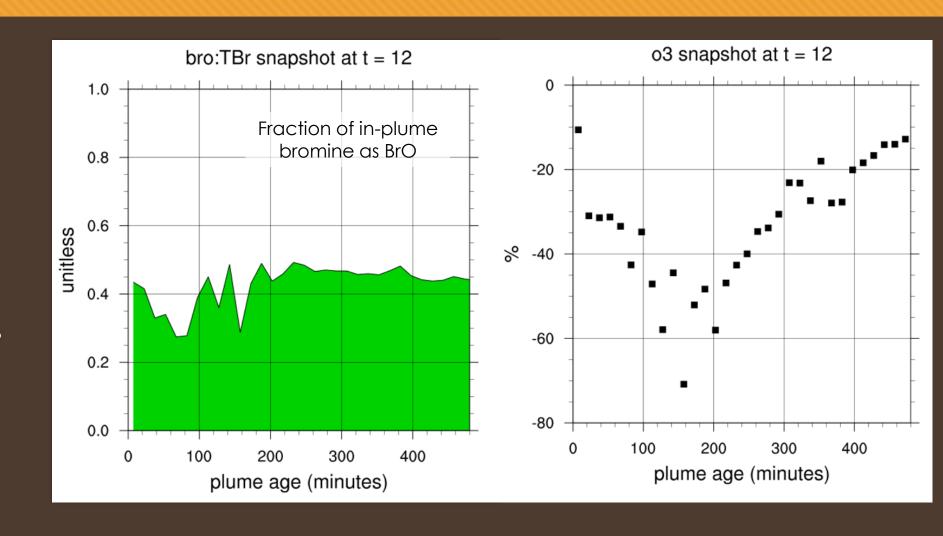
Bulk BrO:total bromine ratio – first hour

- In first few minutes ratio rapidly increases.
- Then decline as O₃depletion impacts



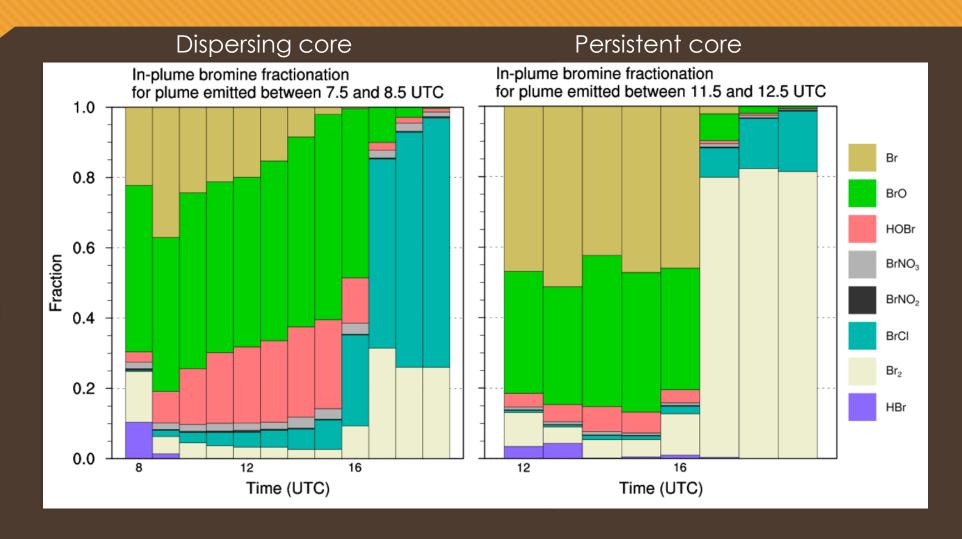
Bulk BrO:total bromine ratio – longer term

- Longer term, O₃ eventually recovers if core "fades"
- BrO reaches approximately stable fraction
 - Stability at ~50% of total Br in this model



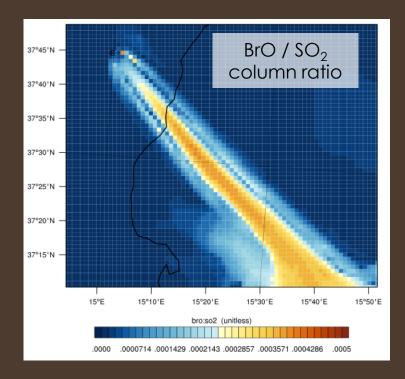
Br fractionation

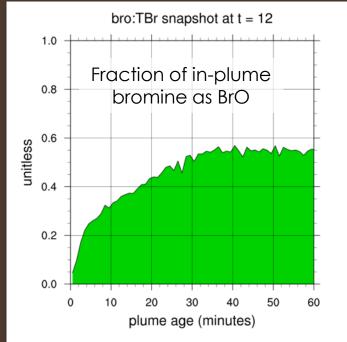
- Tracking bromine fractionation in one piece of plume over the day...
 - Psuedo-lagrangian trace

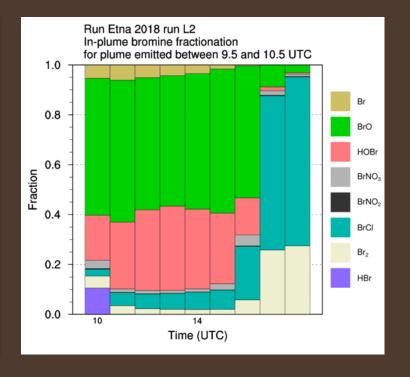


Weaker plume

- For a plume 1/8 of the strength:
 - O No coring Initial redistribution of bromine slower then stability







Conclusions

- SO₂ and BrO in the plume of Etna's Christmas 2018 eruption was detected by TROPOMI
- The BrO/SO₂ ratio was of order a few 10⁻⁴, with significant cross-plume variation
- WRF-Chem volcano (WCV) can replicate BrO formation within a volcanic plume, and the "coring" effect
 - OCIO formation also modelled

- This "coring" is caused by bromine chemistry depleting ozone, which interrupts the bromine cycling
- As O₃ chemistry recovers, BrO reaches a steady state as a fraction of total bromine
- Modelling suggests a daytime bulk observation of BrO in aged plume, should observe approximately half of total bromine
 - O Most reliable once O₃ depletion effect faded
 - O₃ depletion detectable by coring spatial pattern
